Last year we had the second most vehicles representing an orphan marque being beat by 2 Pontiacs.



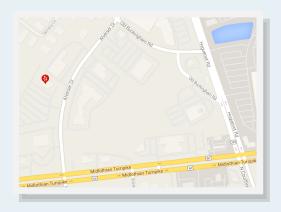

Studebaker Tech Tip

Tech Tips From Jack Heidel STUDEBAKER LUBRICATION

It has been requested that we review the lubrication procedures as they pertain to our Studebaker's. Studebaker's suspension components are very durable and long lasting provided they are lubricated properly and often. I personally don't know of any Studebaker king pins and bushings wearing out if greased on schedule. I know of several that have gone well over 200,000 miles with no rebuild.

The owner's manual recommends a 1,000 mile lubrication schedule. There are 17 zerk fittings on the Studebaker front suspension. There are 3 of these 17 that are the most important and those are the fittings on each king pin and the fitting that services the center point pivot. The center point fitting is often missed because it is located in a hole on the back side of the front cross member. A good quality chassis grease should be used at all these points and the king pins need to have grease oozing from the top and bottom to be sure they are adequately lubed.

Many of the earlier Dana rear axles have a grease fitting at each wheel bearing. It was found that in many cases they were receiving too much grease too often. The grease was pushing out through the axle seals and getting on the brake drums. The fittings were then removed and screw in plugs were put in their place. These were eliminated completely on later axles.

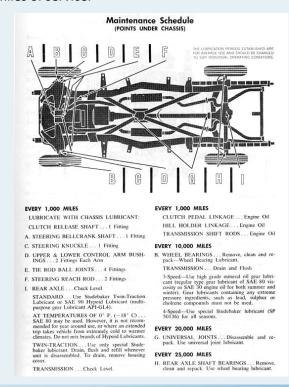
As your rear end has these fittings or plugs, then they should receive 5 pumps of the gun every 5 or 10 thousand miles. This will eliminate the need to pull the hubs, drums, and axles to lubricate the bearings every 10,000 miles as is recommended by the service manual.

Some universal joints have grease fittings. If yours do, they

should receive a pump or two at the recommended intervals. The cars with a two piece drive shaft will have a carrier barring. Don't neglect it if it has a fitting. On the cars with through floor peddles, there is a grease fitting on the peddle pivot under the floor board. Some cars with manual transmission also have a fitting on the bell housing. The steering box should not be neglected and checked frequently. It requires a special semi solid lubricant that is easily sourced from Studebaker International.

As was mentioned previously, Studebaker recommended servicing many of these points at 1,000 mile intervals. The later cars went to a 2,000 mile lubrication schedule and I once had a 1983 Avanti using the Studebaker chassis that recommended a 2,000 mile interval. By the 1966 model year, Studebaker recommended a 6,000 mile lube interval. Much of the increased interval was due to improvements in lubricants, but in the last year or so of production, the increase to 6,000 was probably to match the competition. At that time Ford had introduced extended service intervals and, in fact, some Ford cars didn't come from the factory with grease fittings installed, but were installed later at the first service interval.

I personally would not go 6,000 miles before greasing a Studebaker king pin front suspension. Two Thousand to 3,000 miles seems reasonable with modern lubricants. Properly lubricated, the Studebaker chassis will provide many years and many miles of service.



Studebaker Tech Tip

Is there an "Imp" in your Studebaker?

The "Imp"

(Mischief-maker) can be in the form of the "Accordion" type radiator flex hose as shown on the right. Granted, they can be a blessing in a "Pinch" when a proper molded hose is not available.

During garage tours, zone meets, show and shine events, occasionally you may have seen the "Accordion" pleated flex hoses which are used on Studebakers and other cars. These hoses are potential trouble makers and loved by radiator shops for the damage they can cause if used on a vehicle for an extended period. On Studebakers they will, in time cause the soldered hose adapter on the brass tank to detach



and leak. At least, on a Studebaker, the adapter can be resoldered to the tank but if this type of hose is used on modern cars that have a plastic tank on the radiator, the flex hose will cause a rip in the tank which will need a replacement. If you have this type of hose on your Studebaker, consider replacing it with proper molded hose. Get rid of the "Imp." You do not need a leak in the cooling system of your Stude. Usage of these flex hoses should only be on a temporary basis.

The theory of why a hose causes the detachment of the neck of the radiator when a hose is bent rather than using one that is formed to be used for a specific application

An imaginary line runs through the hose (C) exactly in the center of the hose. The picture shows the line as running from A to B through the entire length of the hose. This is known as the shear line. In the illustration where the hose has been bent, anything above the shear line has been stretched and under tension. The shear line is neutral,

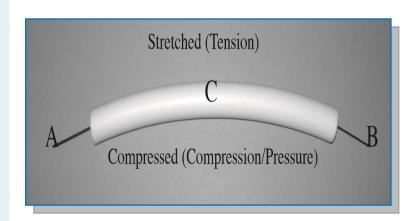
it neither stresses or compresses. Anything below the shear line is compressed.

The molecular structure of the rubber in the hose allows for some stretching and compressing, but, it too does not want to be stressed or compressed. It prefers to go back to the original formation which was originally straight.

It is the rubber in the hose that does not want to continually be under stress, or compression, that it wants to straighten out that causes some of the stress on the neck of the radiator.

This stress action while not visible to the eye is compounded with the constant movement of the engine when it is operating. The engine shifts most when accelerating and decelerating putting further stress on the hose and the radiator neck. In time, the neck of the radiator parts company with the radiator.

In an e-mail from the WMWM (The World's Most Wonderful Mechanic...aka, Dan Dobbins) he had encountered a radiator neck detachment problem on his GT Hawk. Instead of resoldering the neck to the radiator, he used marine epoxy to bond it back together. Either method works but the parts must be absolutely cleaned first.
